pastor's letter

It was simply known as "Big Red." It was a big red metal trailer. I became acquainted with big red during a work week at Pilgrim Hills Church Camp (PH) between my junior and senior years of high school. Big red was eight feet wide and ten feet long, with two foot sides. It was primarily used to haul mulch, dirt and gravel. One project involved adding fill dirt to a 40 foot by 100 foot pavilion, so a brick floor could be laid. Big red was easy to load – a front end loader was used for that – but unloading it was the hard part – shovelful by shovelful. The camp didn't have power dump trailers in those days! Through the several summers I was on staff at PH, I must have helped unload hundreds and hundreds of loads by hand from that trailer. It was a great workout, but also very, very exhausting when we did several loads in the course of an afternoon. What made every load bearable was that two people worked side by side to unload each load of dirt or gravel.

A special group of guys often joined in on unloading big red for larger projects – Burt, Don and Larry. Unloading big red with one of these men by my side really sped up the process – it was always a great competition to see who could unload their side of the trailer first! But who ever got done first, then helped finish unloading the other side, with a bit of ribbing given to the slower of the two.

Those times of unloading big red helped create within me a sense of teamwork outside of organized sports, of working side by side, of which unloading big red was just one such chore. Today, Don & Larry remain my friends, even forty years after getting acquainted. Burt was a life-long friend too, up until his death a few years ago. Our Christian friendship has always been a strong blessing, but even more so in recent times of difficulty we've each gone through. Big red helped forge our friendship, and we didn't even know it at the time. Through our times at the back of big red, I came to value certain truths from the Bible:

- Ecclesiastes 4:9-10 "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their work: If one falls down, his friend can help him up. But pity the man who falls and has no one to help him up!"
- Galatians 6:2 "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."
- Philippians 2:4 "Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others."

Here at SJCC, through our recent focus on mental health, I hope these verses speak to each of us in terms of watching out for one another, of caring for each other, of striving to be compassionate and understanding, of walking side by side with each other. I am very blessed as my friends and I share these Christian qualities. As you read and consider these passages, I'm praying they shape your heart as we live and serve together.

It's so hard to believe that Preschool Graduation is right around the corner! But the weather has warmed up, and we have been able to get out and enjoy the playground during the past few weeks. We continued our "Spring" unit during the first week of April by talking about "Bugs and Butterflies". We learned how many legs bugs have, and talked about many types of bugs. We learned a new word, "symmetry", when we talked about butterflies. We even had several bug and butterfly specimens in our Science Center to look at!

May Mission-A-Month **Cherry Street Mission Ministries**

Cherry Street was founded on Biblical principles in 1947, and remains a Biblically-based, Christ centered organization today. Their Spiritual Advocates consist of both staff and volunteers that lead Bible studies daily and mentor guests through their journey with Christ. Cherry Street has a Men's Division, Women's Division (Sparrow's Nest) and food services.

Each night, Cherry Street provides safe, free shelter for nearly 230 men and women who would otherwise sleep on the street or remain in an abusive situation. For some, it's the first night they've slept safely in a very long time.

Cherry Street is more than food, clothing and shelter. Their redemptive programming is built around one on one discipleship. They care more about who a person is, rather than what a person has become.

Cherry Street is the only organization in the region to offer 3 meals a day, 7 days a week, free of charge to anyone who needs them. Cherry Street gratefully accepts financial donations and gift-in-kind donations (anything donated that is not cash). Habitat for Humanity of Fulton County, Ohio

You might have noticed a small white sided playhouse on a trailer in the church parking lot recently – that's a fundraising project of the Habitat for Humanity of Fulton County Ohio. Tickets are available from Pastor Erich or through the local HFHFCO web site – https:// habitatfco.org/

The planning involved in getting the 2019 HFHFCO house build underway is well started. A three bedroom home for a single mom with three children will be built on Zenobia Street in the northwest section of Wauseon. All of the exterior and interior walls for the home will be built the weekend of May 17th-18th, at a church near Dayton, as part of a partnership with Help Build Hope! The local church will provide the funds for the wall materials and will provide 100 volunteers to frame and sheath all of the walls. Then the walls will be transported to Wauseon. Unfortunately, HFHFCO's Construction Manager, Mr. Bob Sauder, passed away in April and the local affiliate board is working to fill that position. In the meantime, work continues on the permit process, lining up excavation and foundation/crawl space work.





New Sign of a Stroke ------ Stick out Your Tongue!

Ask the person to 'stick' out his/her tongue. If the tongue is 'crooked', if it goes to one side or the other that is also an indication of a stroke.
