How to Tell Your Testimony Without Being Boring

With REVIVE Ohio quickly approaching at the end of this month, I want to focus our attention on evangelism. This summer I read from Sam Chan's book, *Evangelism in a Skeptical World*. Did you know that one of our most important tools in evangelism is our testimony? Yet Sam shared that many Christians don't know how to share their testimonies. At least, they don't know how to share their testimonies in a way that would be interesting or meaningful for others to hear. I, for one, am guilty of this. But perhaps I'm not alone?

Sam wrote that many Christians, if asked to share their testimony, might share something like this: "I was born in a Christian home, to Christian parents, who raised me in the church, and from as early as I can remember (...or when it clicked in high school...or in college....) I believed that Jesus is my Lord and Savior and that he has saved me from all of my sins." If we're honest, we'll admit this is a boring testimony.

If I just offended you, please keep reading. This is, after all, probably how I would normally put my testimony into words as well. First, let me explain what I'm NOT saying. I'm not saying that if you grew up in the church and have been a Christian all your life, then you are somehow inferior to someone who was radically converted from a life of blatant sin later in life. If that's not it, then what am I saying? I'm saying, at least trying to say, what Sam has written: that we need to be equipped to share our testimonies in more meaningful ways.

Sam encourages us to share our testimonies as we would other stories, with an introduction, body, and conclusion. In the introduction, we share who we are, what drives us, and what our deepest longing is; this culminates in our mission in life. Sam shares that as an Asian, he is a high achiever, which drove him to work hard in school and get good grades. He got into a top med school, with the goal of being a doctor (which is a high achiever's dream). As a doctor, people would want to hear his stories at parties, and bankers would want to call him and offer him loans.

In the body of the testimony, we share the downside of what drives us, the cost, the consequences, the toll. For Sam, the high achiever, there were always more mountains to climb. He was never satisfied with what he had accomplished. There were always more trophies to win. And he found out that he really needed these trophies. He needed more and more proof of how good he was. Because as most high achievers really are, Sam was actually quite insecure. Another toll Sam faced as a high achiever, is that he remembered his failures more than his successes. He remembered the one X-Ray that showed his failure as a doctor.

As a bridge between the body and conclusion, Sam shares the time in high school when he read Romans and understood for the first time that Jesus is perfect for us, so that we don't have to be, so that God can love us right now, as we are. In the conclusion of his testimony, Sam talks about facing the decision to continue in full-time medicine or pursue full-time ministry. As a high achiever, he would have been bound to continue in medicine. But with the freedom he found in Christ, he was able to make a different choice, something that would cost him prestige, but something he wanted to do. He also shares about the difference his friends have noticed in him: how he used to be an insecure jerk, and in his insecurity, he would dominate dinner party conversations, and drive aggressively. But with the security he has in Christ, he can be calm behind the steering wheel, and doesn't have to get in the last word, or the longest story, or the best joke.

Sam could tell his testimony two ways. He could say: "I was born to Christian parents and have always been a Christian." Or he could share his testimony as a story, talking about his identity, his struggles, and how he met God in a meaningful way, a life changing way, a way that brought new peace and deep joy to his life. As a Christian, which testimony is more encouraging to hear? If you were not a Christian, which testimony would be more meaningful for you to hear?

Even if you're not planning to participate in REVIVE Ohio at all, take time to write out your story according to Sam's model. If you'd like more information, consider listening to his 10 minute talk on YouTube: "Sam Chan - Everyday Evangelism - How to Share Your Story" (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=qfXnVkpmsyI). And if you're willing, I'd love for you to share your testimony story with me. I'm praying for you as you reflect on these things and fashion your testimony according to this model!

preschool corner

Although the weather says, "summer", it seems like fall is in full swing since school has started!

Our first week of school was spent getting to know our classroom, our rules, our class prayer, our September Bible verse and our friends' names.

Our second week of school was spent focusing on "God Loves Me/I am Special". We talked about how God made each of us different, with special talents and abilities, and how he takes care of us and loves each one of us. During this week, the children brought in the "homework" we had assigned at Orientation. The younger class brought in paper bags containing 3-5 items that describe them, and we started talking about those at Circle Time. Children in the older class completed a poster with a parent's help, titled "All About...." They listed favorite foods, color, etc., and drew pictures depicting their family, greatest wish, favorite place, and what they want to be when they grow up. We shared these at Circle Time, and it was so fun to hear about things we have in common with our classmates, and things that are unique about us.

The third week of the month was spent talking about "Creation". We kept it simple with the younger children, talking about things/people God created and that he took a "nap" and rested on the 7th day. The children made a mobile to hang up at home, with numbers and descriptions of what God created on each day. The older children got more in depth with numbers 1-7 and beginning to identify them, and also gained a better understanding of what God created each day. Their art project depicted each day, with objects and pictures, so they can retell the story.

We have a brand new donation board up in the hallway near the preschool room! Look for the bright red apples in the tree. October Mission-A-Month Operation Christmas Child



Operation Christmas Child is a mission that strives to get needed supplies and The Word of salvation to children living in dire conditions throughout the world. In October, we will be collecting items to be included in plastic boxes that will be packed by volunteers here at our church so these boxes can be delivered to area drop-off locations in time for the Christmas holiday season. If you want to pack your own box, please pick up a plastic box here at the church and use a label from one of the envelopes on the table in the sanctuary narthex to signify on the box if it is for a boy or girl. Place your packed plastic box in or near the white mission box outside the chapel. Or you can just purchase items to be included in boxes that will be packed later. Some suggestions for shoe box items are listed below (or go to www.samaritanspurse.org/operation-christmas-child/pack-a-shoe-box/):

Toys - small cars, balls, dolls, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch[®], toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky[®], etc.

School Supplies - pens, pencils and sharpener, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

Hygiene Items - toothbrush, comb, hairbrush, etc.

Other - Small Bibles, T-shirts, socks, ball caps; sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights (with extra batteries)

A Personal Note - In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself or your family. (If you include your name and address, the child may write back.)


Ryan Christman is heading up this experience, with the involvement of the Mission Committee. Further information to come soon!

Church Treasurer

With the pending retirement of Roger Miller as the church treasurer, the Personnel Committee is beginning the process of searching for the next treasurer of the church. The following job description has been a proved by the Consistory:

Church Treasurer Job Description (August 6, 2019)

The church treasurer is responsible for management of the church's tithes, offerings and finances, including the duties associated with the collection, recording, management, investment, and spending of the church's money.

Position Description

The church treasurer will work with the Consistory to manage the church's finances and attend to general bookkeeping, payroll, and tax responsibilities.

Essential Duties and Responsibilities of a Church Treasurer

- 1. Oversees the collection, sorting, recording and deposit of offerings, donations and other income each week, with assistance from the Ushers, Administrative Assistant and Offering Assistants.
- 2. In conjunction with the Administrative Assistant, issues receipts for large donations.
- 3. Keeps detailed records of all financial transactions.
- 4. Payroll manages payroll of church employees, ensuring accurate and timely processing of payroll, remittance and filing of taxes, preparation of tax forms (i.e. W-2's, 1099's), and health insurance online compliance forms with the government.
- 5. Assists the Personnel Committee with pre-hire forms such as I-9's and W-4's
- 6. Provides church ledger to the Administrative Assistant, who will reconciles church bank statements with the church's ledger.
- 7. Works with the Budget and Stewardship Committee to invest large donations to supplement the church's trust.
- 8. Assists in tracking investments and delivers quarterly earnings statement to the church's board.
- 9. Presents a quarterly statement on the church's finances to church members and donors.
- 10.Participates in any financial audits.
- 11. Inspires confidence from the congregation and the staff as to his or her integrity and ability.
- 12. Attends meetings with the church executive staff to go over finances and stay aware of any upcoming expenses, events, or changes to the church's operation.

Required Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

- 1. Must have strong general competencies with bookkeeping, financial auditing, investing, accounting, and processing.
- 2. Must be very well organized and have an exceptional attention to detail.
- 3. Must be trustworthy and honest in all dealings.
- 4. Must be committed to the mission and goals of the church.
- 5. Must be familiar with the tax code as governs religious and non-profit entities.
- 6. Must be willing to research and learn more about effective financial practices, accounting, bookkeeping and filing taxes.
- 7. Must be able to work well with church staff, volunteers, committee members, and the church's leader-ship.
- 8. Must be comfortable being supervised in a close capacity.
- 9. Must be committed to the confidentiality of all donations and financial information.
- 10. Must be familiar with Microsoft Excel and with Quick Books.

Education and Experience

- 1. Preferably will have a bachelor's degree in finance, accounting, or business.
- 2. Must have experience as a CPA, treasurer of a company or organization, or finance management.

Leadership Development

There is also an awareness that many leaders might not believe they are fully equipped to accept a leadership nomination, so the Spiritual Council will be offering some leadership development classes in the near future..

How many leadership positions are there in SJCC? Currently, the following positions are filled in the ministry of SJCC:

- Officers 2 (Must be a member of SJCC)
- Elders 6 (Must be a member of SJCC)
- Deacons/Deaconesses 9 (Must be a member of SJCC)
- Accompanists/Worship Leaders/Song Leaders/Children's Message Leaders/Techs/Band 21
- Committee Members 62 (with some serving on multiple committees)
- Ministry Teachers/Leaders/Servants over 70 (many serve in multiple capacities)
- That's a total of 170 leadership positions! Wow!

What are the basic qualifications of being a leader in SJCC ministries? A quick list includes:

- 1. Engage in daily devotions, daily prayer and be active in the ministries of the congregation
- 2. Be representative of the congregation
- 3. Willingness to volunteer time towards meetings and activities
- 4. Openness to share in discussions and decision making in committee meetings
- 5. Enthusiasm and commitment in participating in the committee's work
