pastor's letter

'Tis the Season for Hospitality

"[Mary] gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." -Luke 2:7

Hospitality (or lack of hospitality) plays a big role in the Christmas story. There was no room for Joseph and Mary when they came to Bethlehem. So Mary gave birth in a barn and laid Jesus in a manger.

In Luke 2, Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census be taken across the entire Roman empire, requiring families to register at the father's hometown. Imagine what a boon in industry such a decree would cause in our culture today: the amount of gas consumed by travelers, the Big Macs eaten along the highways, the hotel rooms reserved from place to place. Imagine the comings and goings of Archbold-born families returning for the census, and other families leaving Archbold for their hometowns. Perhaps as my family headed out for North Canton, Ohio, I'd lend my house to my brother- and sister-in-law returning to the area from Columbus?

This would be quite a decree, wouldn't it? Of course, back then, there were no gas stations or automobiles, no fast food restaurants, or hundred-room-hotels. Many times, travelers would look to stay in a guest room in someone's home, as they walked from town to town. If this decree happened today, Archbold would likely not only be receiving back their own, but Wauseon-born folks would stop overnight as they travelled in from the west, and Defiance-born folks would stop in as they travelled south. The Heritage Inn staff would have headaches from the traffic and the dizzying turnover. And of course, the inn would be full. And there would be travelers yet in need of a place to stay.

We sometimes begrudge the B.C. Bethlehem dwellers for their lack of hospitality for poor Joseph and verypregnant Mary. But perhaps the small town was just full, and every guest room had already been filled? We think: "surely there was at least one room left in this town, where someone could have opened their home to the miserable couple?" But what if Joseph's predicament arose not because of Bethlehem's lack of hospitality, but precisely because of their abundance in hospitality?

We can speculate on the situation 2000 years ago, but we can evaluate our own with more precision. And this, of course, is my point. Jesus lived in a culture that lived and breathed hospitality, and this was their glory. I'm afraid we live in a culture that largely neglects hospitality, and it is our shame. Our Lord Jesus calls us to be different; he calls us to be lights in this dark world; he calls us to be hospitable:

- "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers" (Hebrews 13:2)
- "Show hospitality to one another without grumbling" (1 Peter 4:9)
- "Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality" (Romans 12:13)

What will it look like for us to be faithful to our Lord's commands? What will it look like for us to be hospitable? The Greek word for hospitality is really a compound word that means "brotherly love for the stranger." Think of the love you show your family. The gifts you get your children. The meals you share as you gather with your extended family. The ways you ask questions of those you love and listen to them give their answers and share their stories. Being hospitable means showing this same familial love to someone outside your family, someone in need not just of material support, but someone in need of love. Really, this is what Christmas is all about. Jesus came from heaven and earth to share with us poor sinners the riches of his family's love, welcoming us and inviting us in, including us, adopting us as his own. When we see what we have been given in Jesus, something changes in our hearts, where we care less about ourselves and our possessions, and care more and more about sharing God's amazing love with others...even (and especially) through our hospitality.

preschool corner

We participated in many fall activities this past month! During the first week, the Tues-Thurs classes made scarecrows at the Art Center, identified "largest" and "smallest" items by circling fall items with dry erase markers at the Fine Motor Center, and matched pumpkin shapes in a game at the Math Center. They also did object sorting at the Game Center. The Mon-Wed-Fri classes explored "absorption" when they made leaves with coffee filters and markers at the Art Center. Some of their other activities included letter tracing in sand trays, making patterns at the Math Center and drawing fall trees at the Easel. They also made cute owls with popsicle sticks at the Woodworking Center. We talked about the many signs of fall, and sang some fun songs including, "Gray Squirrel", "Five Fall Leaves" and "Rake up the Leaves". After that, we spent a week talking about Food, and included the story of The Five Loaves and Two Fish. One of our parents even sent in a snack of five loaves (vanilla wafers) and two fish (Swedish fish candy)! The older classes talked about the differences between fruits and vegetables, healthy food and treats, and glued pictures of favorite foods into a book to be sent home with the children on a rotating basis. Other concepts we worked on with this group include numbers and number sets, sequencing, and starting to match up capital and lower case letters. The younger (Tues-Thurs) classes sorted tiny fruit, matched up shapes in an Oreo cookie game, and "filled their body" with healthy foods by gluing at the Art Center. During our "Thanksgiving" theme the last two weeks of the month, we focused on the blessings God gives us, and how we are thankful for them. We also talked about the first Thanksgiving, and how it differs from our Thanksgiving today. The children participated in many turkey activities, such as "fringing" feathers, matching turkey shapes and painting Thanksgiving pictures at the Easel. We also sang some fun songs such as "Turkey in the Straw", "Turkey Trot Hokey Pokey" and "There's a Turkey on My Nose".

December Mission-A-Month Crossroads

For more than 134 years, Crossroad Child & Family Services in Fort Wayne, Indiana, has focused on the needs of children and families who have few alternatives.

Today, they work with emotionally troubled children other providers have chosen not to work with, or have failed to help. These children may also be mentally developmentally disabled, autistic and/or experiencing the results of brain trauma, have parents with substance abuse problems and/or have experienced sexual abuse. In their residential and education services, these children are as young as age six. Much too often, they are children who have been hurt the worst by those who should have protected them the most.

Their needs for therapy, education, and family support services are complicated and challenging. Yet, Crossroad's outcomes are extremely good! Crossroad provides services in their school "Crossroad Academy", and in residential, outpatient, and community based services. Crossroad will serve nearly 400 youth this year.

Today, the growing adult opioid epidemic (heroin/prescription drug addiction) and trafficking trends have led to a growing number of children needing therapeutic help; there are more children on Crossroad's waiting list for services than their total number of beds. The need is growing and Crossroad needs resources to help more children!

Back Bay Mission Trip – February 9-15, 2020

Since 2000, this will be the 40th trip SJCC has made to Biloxi, MS, to partner with Back Bay Mission. There have been countless experiences enjoyed by 129 participants from SJCC and partner churches (from Arizona, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Montana, Nevada, Ohio, Tennessee).

Forty trips in twenty years is a significant and blessed ministry. A wealth of awareness has been gained in learning about homelessness and poverty, and many homeowners have been blessed with improved living conditions and mental health as stress has been relieved.

With the aging of the core group of participants, for these trips to continue beyond 2020, an influx of younger volunteers is needed, and many are praying for the future of our partnership with Back Bay Mission. These weeks are filled with work, fellowship, education and growth. Yes, the work can be hard and the heat and humidity can be high, but in the end, the blessings of growth of faith and relationships outweighs everything else.

It's a fifteen hour trip to and from Biloxi, which is long, but the hours provide plenty of time for conversation and relaxation. The week in Biloxi is one of service and fulfillment, working mornings and afternoons and relaxing in the evenings. There is work for any level of abilities, and people can also serve in the Mission's day shelter or food pantry, or help with the local soup kitchen.

We'll be offering some new Back Bay Mission presentations for people to learn more about these weeks of mission and faith.

Summer Mission Trip – June 14-19, 2020

The summer mission trip has been happening for about 20 years now, and they've been working with LaPorte County Habitat for Humanity for at least the last 10 years. There is a core group of St. John's folks who have enjoyed the week's activities, and they're always looking for additional folks to join them. Lodging and dining at Tower Hill Camp in Sawyer, Michigan, the group travels about 30 minutes to Laporte or Michigan City to the build site and works the morning and afternoons at some phase of new home construction. Further information about the details of the week will be shared come the first of the year!

DR Mission Trip – June 13-20, 2020

St. John's supports two missionary families serving with Freedom International Ministries in the Dominican Republic – Jason & Becky Suon and Daniel & Bethany Schrock. The home church of the Suon's and the Shrock's is Pettisville Missionary Church (PMC). St. John's and PMC are partnering for a mission trip in June.

PMC is sending their youth and youth leaders, and SJCC is sending youth and adults interested in this cross-cultural experience. Freedom runs a Christian school in the DR with 300 students in preschool through grade six. Trip participants will have the opportunity to work with the children in their summer program, as well as work on ongoing construction of the school.



Parish Hall Heating System

Following the thorough cleaning and maintenance of the boiler this past summer, once the heating system was started up for the winter season, leaks were discovered in the parish hall floor. That discovery resulted in two of the three heating loops being cut and capped off, as one of those two loops had been shut off several years ago due to leaks. The Property Committee explored options to make up for the heat loss and settled on a new forced air system.

In September, the Consistory approved the replacement of one of the air conditioning units for the parish hall as it was no longer functioning. That was at a cost of \$11,285. With that replacement work pending, it has been decided to install a new unit that will both heat and cool the parish hall. This new forced air unit will be installed in one of the existing north side windows, which will make installation and future service much more accessible. A compressor unit will sit on the ground outside the window. With one of the air conditioning units and one of the heating loops still working in the parish hall, only one of the new units needs to be installed at this time. When either the remaining air conditioning unit or the remaining heat loop fails, a second forced air unit can be installed.

This new unit will cost \$18,000, installed, and was ordered in time for delivery and installation to occur during the first week of January. As heat is a necessity for the colder months of January and February, Consistory took emergency action to approve this expenditure.

The Personnel Committee has had a first interview with someone interested in the position and will have a second meeting with the candidate in early December. Stewardship – 2019 Finances

A Snap Shot of Our Year to Date Stewardship - as of November 25, 2019

- 2019 Mission Year to Date Income \$132,290

The financial figures shown here from the Operating Fund show a difference from earlier reports. Three significant debits have been removed from the expense side of the report: 1) \$24,000 transfer from the checking account to the savings account, 2) \$10,000 from the operating fund given towards the emergency roof project at Cherry Street Mission Ministries, 3) \$2,500 was given to the Christian Preschool to assist in meeting their annual budget. These three debits have somewhat distorted the expense reports this year, though they are actual expenditures, mostly from operating savings.
