### **Pastoral Letter**

November 23, 2020

St. John's Christian Church,

It is on my final day of quarantine that I write this letter to the congregation of St. John's Christian Church. Being in isolation and quarantine for 19 days has been quite the experience. How grateful I am that Lynne and I exhibited no symptoms of the virus. How grateful I am for the ability to connect remotely to the office computer network so I could continue to work from home. How grateful I am for the continued improvement of technology and volunteer techs who enabled me to plan worship and preach from home.

I find it appropriate that the Discovery Guide devotional of today covered Luke 20:20-26 in which Jesus responded to the question of the spies, sent by the teachers of the law and the chief priests by saying, "Then give to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's." Appropriate from my perspective because I've relied upon this verse for direction throughout this pandemic.

I have prayerfully sought wisdom from the Lord as I have personally and corporately journeyed through these last three weeks and the long months of the pandemic. I have worked to assimilate information from many different sources in regards to appropriate leadership and direction. I have diligently striven to honor God as one of his disciples while also honoring the officials of the United States of America as a citizen of the country, including local elected officials and staff.

Through these months, as a Christian, as I live out my calling as a minister of the Gospel, I recognize that I have sacrificed by my own personal preferences and desires. I believe I have been called to abandon what I myself would do or how I myself would respond. I have not abandoned my faith or my allegiance to Jesus Christ as Lord. What I have abandoned is my right to do as I please, for I am called to live as God calls me to live.

I live in faith, without fear. I have no fear of illness and no fear of death. I willingly give myself into the full service of the Lord, with all the blessings and trials such service entails. The Apostle Paul endured such blessing and trials, enjoying fellowship with God and fellowship with his co-laborers in Christ as he endured the physical ordeals of travel in his day, endured jeers and hatred, imprisonment and persecution. What Paul endured was so much greater than anything that's come my way, and his perseverance spurs me on in such times as we are currently enduring.

I do not view the pandemic and the health guidelines put in place to deal with the pandemic as ways to attack our personal freedoms as Americans or the work of Satan to tear apart the church. Instead, I view it all as an opportunity to be tested by God. As I write those words, I'm mindful of chapters one and two in the Book of Job, and I encourage you to read those chapters now. God permitted the testing of Job's faith. I continue to wonder what God is teaching me, teaching each of us, in this time.

I know the church will survive these times, both the church universal and St. John's Christian Church. I believe in the authority of the words of Jesus, and I rely upon his lessons in all aspects of being the church. As Peter proclaimed, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God;" in Matthew 16:16, Jesus responded to him by saying, "And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it." Established on the solid foundation of the Bible, of God's holy Word, the church will endure.

I know that I and the lay leaders of the church have been both supported and criticized over our response, or perceived lack of response, to the pandemic. Legally, we did not need to suspend our ministries, as the state has exempted religious organizations from certain aspects of the guidelines. Yet, when the governor of the state asks for your assistance and cooperation, which is supported by local entities and shared guidance, it wasn't a matter of legality, but a matter of health and compassion.

## Pastoral Letter (Cont.)

I offer insight from my perspective, a perspective that has been informed and shaped in several ways:

- 1. I've been in regular contact with three different groups of pastors throughout the pandemic. I've sought knowledge, discernment and guidance from these brothers and sisters in Christ.
- 2. I've studied Scripture, with a focus on listening for God's voice and direction.
- 3. I've been blessed to have conversations, Zoom calls and printed information from county health departments, county health department staff I personally know, medical professionals involved in hospital and medical work, and I've participated in virtual meetings with state government officials.
- 4. I've tried to keep up on information on how churches and pastors throughout the nation have responded. I've received forwarded information from several members of St. John's.
- 5. The monthly discussions with the members of Consistory have been informative as I've heard views of people involved in medical, business, educational and community areas of work.

From my sense of Christian pastoral leadership, here is what I have to offer you in this letter:

- 1. Trust in the Lord, for he is faithful and just. Read and meditate upon Scripture, and you'll be comforted and guided. God has used this time in my life and in the ministry I lead to emphasize further Biblical study and discernment. I know the church would be tremendously blessed if each one of us deepened our trust in God and engaged in greater devotion to the Word.
- 2. Pray to the Lord, as Jesus prayed in the garden on the night of his arrest. While his disciples were tired and sleepy, Jesus prayed, repeatedly. Pray for God's will to be done.
- 3. Believe in and live out the greatest commandment "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind" (Matthew 22:37). Take this time to invigorate your faith relationship with the Lord your God.
- 4. Believe in and live out the second greatest commandment "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39). Acts of kindness, love and compassion increased in response to the pandemic, as neighbors cared for neighbors. Such acts need to continue. I ask you to make greater efforts to think about, care for, and understand others. Many have equated caution with fear. Many have equated difference of thought with "I'm right, you're wrong." Many have placed their own response as all that needs to matter. Those are not ways of the Gospel.
- 5. Respect one another. I don't fully know how to describe how grieved I am by the hatred, the judgmental nature and how divisive our society and we can be. I think of how a child can throw a tantrum when he or she doesn't get their way. Grumbling and complaining doesn't move us forward. In your love of God, let His Spirit guide you in the ways of respect and unity.
- 6. Persevere look up that word in Scripture as there are so many references to consider. Noah spent 370 days on board the ark. The Israelites endured through 400 years of slavery, they wandered in the wilderness for 40 years, and they waited 700 years from Micah's prophecy to the birth of the Messiah. These months of 2020 have been long and tiring, and life has been disrupted and changed, yet we must persevere in faith and obedience to God. In time, I believe a great sense of normality will be restored to life, though not everything will return to normal. I wait expectantly for normality, knowing that life is constantly changing.
- 7. As we enter into the Advent season, celebrating the birth of Jesus and awaiting with expectation our Lord's return, I pray that the hope, peace, joy and love of Advent will be etched upon our hearts in new ways this year. As we look forward to when the pandemic is no longer, let us look forward to the time of Christ's return, focusing our devotion and energy upon our Lord and Savior.

### The Christmas Star

Do you remember the story of the Christmas Star? It's a story of an amazing star, amazing men, and an amazing God. First, an amazing star. The story is found in Matthew 2. This amazing star is described as "appearing" (v.7), as if it previously had not existed; catching the Magi's attention by "rising" in the sky (v.2); leading the Magi by "going ahead of them" (v.9) and by "stopping over the place where the child was" (v.10). Apparently, the star somehow indicated one house in particular, because the Magi are not only guided to Bethlehem, but are guided to the house of Joseph, Mary, and Jesus (v.11). That's an amazing star!

Now, let's consider the amazing men. The Magi of Matthew 2 notice this star appear and rise, and somehow they realize this means that a boy has been born who will become King of the Jews (v.2). Some have suggested the Eastern homeland (v.1) of these Magi is Babylon, where the Jews had once been exiled, and which still had a large Jewish population at the time of Jesus' birth. They suggest that these Magi probably had some familiarity with Jewish history and prophecy, as they suppose the star means a Jewish King has been born. Perhaps through the Jews of Babylon, they became familiar with Numbers 24:17, a prophecy about a future king and a star?

Anyway, these men are amazing because somehow they correctly discern the meaning of this new star. And then they decide to follow the star to the home of the newborn king. If Babylon was truly their homeland, their journey would have been over 1,500 miles...in the days before engines were invented! In addition to the sacrifice of making a journey of hundreds of miles and many days, they decide to lavish the newborn king with costly gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh (v.11). But even more than this, somehow they correctly discern that this newborn king is worthy of their worship, and when they meet baby Jesus, they bow down and worship him (v.11).

We might be a bit baffled by the Magi. How did they recognize the star and know what it meant? Truly, they were "wise men," in that they were well studied. But when we realize what they studied we likely will be only further baffled. The Magi were pagan astrologers. They studied and sought guidance from star charts and from the occult, not from God's Word. They followed stars, not the One who made the stars.

This leads us to the most amazing part of the story: our amazing God. God is the one who made all the universe and who governs how the universe works. And so, he has forbidden his people from divination, and instructed his people to seek truth in him, not in the occult. Today, studying star charts will not lead us to God or to godliness. But for some reason, at this remarkable time in history, God condescended to speak the truth of who he is and what he was doing even through astrology. He used a star to speak to the Magi, these pagan astrologers, and they listened, and they followed the star, and it led them to him. It was enough that God spoke through the Bible, and through His Son, but in his great grace, he also spoke through the Christmas Star, that he might not only draw the Jews to himself, but even those who were far off, those of different nationalities and religions. And in his great grace, our amazing God is still drawing to himself the least likely to find him, and those who are furthest from him.

## **Consistory**

Once again the Consistory discussed current pandemic information and its potential effects upon our ministries. A risk chart from the CDC and an area health system listed in-person worship at a church as one of the highest of highest risks in this time.

It was shared that attendance in Faith Village has ranged from two to five children for most Sundays since classes were resumed. The last night of Logos and JYF for the fall semester was November 18th, 2020. Quarantine situations were rising in number as the virus spread, affecting attendance at school, work and church. As a result of the discussion, the Consistory approved a motion to suspend youth ministries (referring to all children's and youth ministries) from November 19th until after the first of the year.

Since that decision was shared with the congregation, a number of our adult ministries chose to suspend gathering in similar fashion.

Time in December will be spent planning for a resumption of ministries in early January. Factors impacting those plans will be updated health directives, the ability to line up volunteers for staffing each ministry, and the willingness of people to attend each ministry.

### **Preschool Corner**

We participated in many fall activities this past month! The first week of the month, we were learning all about apples. We learned that there are different types of apples, and each class had a taste test to see which they liked the best. They tasted the following three apples: Red Delicious, Golden Delicious and Granny Smith. We talked about whether they were sweet or sour, and soft or crunchy. We sang "Here We Go Round the Apple Tree," "A-P-P-L-E," and "Way Up High in the Apple Tree." The Monday-Wednesday-Friday classes learned about Johnny Appleseed and made an art project about how apples grow. We made "apple pie" in the sensory table with a combination of nutmeg, cloves, cinnamon, ginger, small imitation apples, spoons and pans. The Tuesday-Thursday classes sorted pom-pom "apples" with large tweezers at the Fine Motor Center and did color matching at the Game Table.

The "Fall" theme came next, followed by "Thanksgiving." Some of the activities the children participated in included letter tracing in sand trays, making patterns at the Math Center and making fall trees with puzzle pieces. The younger class made adorable fall wreaths to hang at home. The older children went on a leaf walk, collecting different types of leaves, and everyone sang fun songs including, "Gray Squirrel," "Five Fall Leaves," and "Rake up the Leaves."

During our "Thanksgiving" theme, we focused on the blessings God gives us and how we are thankful for them. We also talked about the first Thanksgiving and how it differs from our Thanksgiving today. The children participated in many turkey activities, such as matching turkey shapes, completing a turkey "cutting" activity, and painting Thanksgiving pictures at the Easel. We also sang some fun songs such as "Turkey in the Straw," "Turkey Trot Hokey Pokey," and "There's a Turkey on My Nose." Our Bible verse for November was Psalm 107:1, "Give thanks to the Lord."
