Pastor's Column

Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 – "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven: ² a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot, ³ a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build, ⁴ a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance, ⁵ a time to scatter stones and a time to gather them, a time to embrace and a time to refrain, ⁶ a time to search and a time to give up, a time to keep and a time to throw away, ⁷ a time to tear and a time to mend, a time to be silent and a time to speak, ⁸ a time to love and a time to hate, a time for war and a time for peace."

There is time, there are seasons, and there is change. I write this column on January 20th, the Day of Inauguration of the next President of America. Change has come, and further change will be coming. Whichever news source one reads or listens to, there is general awareness we are living in a time of dissension, with divisions between people and parties, with hope and/or concern, and even, worry, of what's to come in the days ahead. Whether one responds with hope or concern depends upon one's perspective, and I would believe it depends upon our faith and trust in the Lord.

In Joshua 24, Joshua speaks to the gathered people of Israel, seeking to renew the covenant God had established with Israel. Joshua challenges the people to choose whom they will serve – the Lord or their foreign gods. Verse 15 reminds us of Joshua's leadership when he tells the people, "But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Then in verse 24 we read the people's response, as they said to Joshua: "We will serve the Lord our God and obey him."

One of the bedrock beliefs the congregation identified in a time of visioning and discernment continues to be a foundational statement of our ministry today – God is in control. Joshua believed this. Israel believed this. We must believe this. In our bent to sinfulness, we can lose our focus on this tenet, and so we must continually come before the Lord and renew our covenant of faith and obedience.

We are confronted and immersed in a time of vast change, globally and locally – political change, change resulting from or caused by a global pandemic, changing of our ministry as the St. John's Christian Preschool program comes to an end, and pastoral change as Alex Young's time with us comes to an end.

In regards to the changes coming with the preschool and the associate pastor, I pray that we can each rely on the words of change expressed in Ecclesiastes 3. The St. John's Christian Preschool has been a tremendous blessing of ministry. The preschool was blessed with gifted and wonderful administrators, in Cheri, Wendy, Linda, and Sue; and with talented and faithful teachers, in Darlene, Becky, Toni, and Joan. We thank the Lord for their presence and efforts for 31 years of preschool ministry. The Lord called Alex to serve as the associate pastor of the congregation. He has served well, with faithfulness, grace and peace. Let each of us uphold him and his family in our prayers as he seeks the next call the Lord is lining up for him.

In this time, and in all times, let us look to Lord, who is faithful and compassionate.

December Update:

December was a busy month, as the children learned about the birth of Jesus our Savior as they excitedly looked forward to Christmas. Associate Pastor's End of Call

The following is the full text of the oral report Pastor Erich prepared for presentation at the annual meeting of the congregation:

I continue to believe in the active presence and the working of the Holy Spirit amongst us all as a congregation. I, as the pastor of St. John's, always strive to honor the trust the congregation places in me, as well as the trust of our congregation's leadership. Our past and present have been shaped by the Lord, preparing all things for the future under the counsel and direction of the Spirit of God.

It is recognized that Pastor Alex is a person with several spiritual gifts and pastoral abilities. He was called to St. John's by the Spirit of the Lord, through the search and call process established by the church. He has served with faithfulness and compassion.

It is through the guidance of the Holy Spirit, with discernment and prayer that the Consistory believed that a change should be made at this time, for the well-being of both Pastor Alex and the congregation. The members of this church who have been elected to Consistory are people of faith and people of compassion, people who lead using their experiences in the church, in education, in business, in agriculture, and in finance.

The annual review process overseen by the Personnel Committee prompted the Consistory to evaluate the pastoral staffing of the church. Following four years of ministry with the congregation, it was the discernment of the Consistory that the gifts and abilities of Pastor Alex differ in the expectations of the associate pastor's position as outlined in the job description of the associate pastor position.

I believe the Lord will bless Pastor Alex with a new call of ministry, and I hope that his time with us here at St. John's is seen as part of his being further equipped in ministry.

It is recognized such decisions are difficult to make, to publish, and to communicate. The letter mailed to the congregation was meant to share the action taken. We know it was sudden news for people to hear. The timing was such that it was known so people could raise questions at this year's annual meeting for further understanding. People with further questions and comments may be in contact with the Consistory, the Personnel Committee, or myself.

Transition Time – Pastoral Staff

"What's next?" is an obvious question to be asking in this time of pastoral staff transition. The Consistory will establish a process and timeline, reviewing job descriptions and the traditional search and call process, as well as recent discernment work of the congregation. A special congregational meeting will be scheduled in the next month or so for congregational input and discussion. More information will follow regarding the scheduling and format of this meeting.

Consistory (cont.)

Annual Congregational Meeting Sunday, January 17, 2021

Congregational President Gary Frazier called the 2021 Annual Meeting to order and invited Pastor Erich to offer an opening prayer. In light of both in-person and Zoom participants, Gary Frazier and Jocelyn Walker reviewed procedural guidelines for everyone. A count of members present noted a quorum of 105 members, with 16 more members joining the meeting prior to the time of the election.

The SJCC mission/vision statement, Come Hear the Reason we're Inspired to Serve Together, was reviewed, highlighting some of the top 10 Bedrock Beliefs identified by the congregation in 2006. God is in control. We are always seeking His guidance and direction. As the fellowship of believers in Christ, we found ways to worship and touch base outside the church building during the pandemic.

President Frazier reviewed the ballot, sharing that Kim S. Walker accepted the nomination as congregational secretary. There being no nominations from the floor, members proceeded to mark their ballots.

The 2020 Financial Reports were reviewed, with time spent considering pages 9 and 10 of the meeting packet, detailing pertinent changes to the accounting system over the course of the past year. The Investment Report was not available for review. It was noted that the Operating Budget and Mission Budget included changes to how certain line items were to be accounted for in the new system. The Capital Improvement Fund will be closed and those annual expenses will be in the Operating Budget. The capital funds in the Springer Scholarship have been fully disbursed, so this fund reached its conclusion.

Results of the election were – President - Gary Frazier; Congregational Secretary - Kim S. Walker; Elders – Jon Lindsay and Betsy Redd; Deacon/Deaconess – Karen Walker, Missy Warncke and Bruce Wooley

Laura Johnson presented on behalf of the Personnel Committee. Laura notified the congregation of a change of health insurance providers, now with Anthem. This change provided a decrease in premiums, with a slight change in the policy in regard to prescriptions. The decrease in the budget was \$18,791.00.

Questions arose regarding the End of Call Agreement for Pastor Alex. It was shared that all decisions made by the Personnel Committee and Consistory were shaped through discernment and the guidance of the Spirit of the Lord, following the results of the annual review process. Concerns from the congregation regarding Alex's End of Call Agreement were expressed and responded to, as well as praises given for his work while here.

The proposed 2021 Operating Budget was reviewed, with key changes being noted. The Property Committee has proposed hiring a part-time maintenance person with a proposed cost of up to \$20,000.00. The annual church maintenance costs, which used to be part of the Capital Improvement Fund, are being transferred to the Operating Budget because they are annual expenses. Camp Scholarships, College Scholarships, Evangelical Association fees, Love Fund, St. Johns Evangelism Outreach and WMTR expenses are transferring from the Mission Budget to the Operating Budget because they are ministries of the church.

The proposed Mission Budget was reviewed. Some mission trips have been postponed until a later date due to issues with the pandemic. The Consistory recommended a new sponsorship of the Fairlawn Chaplain Ministry, at a support level of \$2,000 per year. The Mission Budget appears to be reduced by \$26,000.00, most of which results from the above mentioned items being transferred to the Operating Budget.

Consistory (cont.)

The report of the ceasing of the St. Johns Christian Preschool was included in the meeting packet. Compliments were offered on behalf of the Preschool staff.

In his written and oral reports, Pastor Erich acknowledged the change in transition. 2020 was a difficult year and many difficult changes were made. He has relied on the wisdom and guidance of the Holy Spirit. He offered thanks to all those who help serve the church in so many capacities with their work shaped by the Spirit of the Lord. Pastor Erich closed with a reference to Romans 5:3-5.

In his oral report, Pastor Alex shared words of gratitude. Pastor Alex reviewed activities and ministries that he has enjoyed being part of. Alex shared some newly created activities such as ministries of care. He closed with a Benediction.

Jeff Rutledge gave a brief report on the work of the Facility Committee. The committee has developed a Building Program with G5 Architecture. 40% of first estimate was for HVAC costs. In December, an HVAC engineering team looked at the church, and the committee is awaiting follow up on that.

Ministry Happenings

Sunday Morning and Wednesday Evening Children's and Youth Ministries

Our Logos, JYF, SYF and Life Planning programs remain suspended as of now. Ministry leaders have been meeting via Zoom to discuss and discern. The mission of the series is to connect men. In combat, it's trained into the soldiers. In the church, we need to get past the shallow talk and get real with each other. The video series is designed to create awareness that every man needs another man to cover his six (his back).

Sessions are held on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 p.m. in the Chapel and consist of 20-30 minute video clips followed by 30 minutes for discussion. Please consider joining to better connect with men in our ministry and community alike!

FISH Food Pantry



It is the goal of the Archbold FISH Food Pantry to assist low-income families on a short-term basis, particularly those in a crisis situation, and to share God's grace. All of the households served have an Archbold mailing address, live in the Archbold school district, or attend a church which supports the Archbold FISH Pantry. Because of fear of Covid-19 and stimulus checks payments, overall numbers are down; however, the number of new families needing assistance has increased significantly. FISH is making home deliveries, offering nocontact pickup at the pantry, and allowing a few shoppers at a one time into the pantry to choose their own items on pantry days. We also help families with rent, utility payments, or prescriptions. The Archbold FISH Pantry is completely reliant on the donations from generous people in our community.

Additionally, the FISH Food Pantry has put together "Buy One...Give One" baskets looking for businesses, salons, fitness centers, and other business owners who would be willing to put a basket in their place of business from now until April to help collect personal care items (which public assistance does not provide for).
