

Pastor's Column

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel." Isaiah 7:14

The book of Isaiah was written around 700 B.C., 700 years before the virgin gave birth to a son, who would be called Immanuel. Immanuel means "God with us." 700 years. 700 years of waiting. 700 years of prophecy. 700 years of anticipation and expectation. This length of 700 years of waiting is a point of reflection for me each Advent season, and maybe more so this year.

As the nation of Israel waited for the coming of the Messiah, the Hebrew people went through many periods of strong faith that were separated by times of weak faith. Generations of faithfulness were often followed by generations of faithlessness, all while the promise of a messiah was before them.

In the Advent season of anticipation and expectation, knowing Jesus as the Messiah, Christians look to the future for the time when Christ shall return. Christians have waited for over 2000 years for that promised return, and we continue to wait, living by faith, with great patience and perseverance. Such are my reflections in this Advent season, a needed reminder in our own day and time.

As a nation, we long for relief from a global pandemic and the associated health protocols and mandates. Yet the effects of the pandemic and the many aspects of disruption it caused continue to linger. In the church, including within St. John's, various effects continue to be felt. Several annual events have been altered or postponed. There are fewer adults volunteering and attendance in children, youth and adult ministries continues to lag behind pre-pandemic levels. People have switched churches and many have stopped attending. This is what I've read in publications about churches across the nation, including local churches and St. John's.

As I pray for wisdom and direction amidst these lingering realities, I wait with expectation. I wait in anticipation for an increase of devotion to the Lord, in a sense of renewal and restoration.

While there are many people volunteering to lead and assist with many ministries, there is always a need for more volunteers. We are in a lull in regards to our music ministry, and I await the person who will be called as the pastor of music and worship. I am grateful for the people helping to bolster our worship music ministries. We are in the annual process of nominations and I await to hear the responses of the many nominees. I continue to work at recruiting people to be trained as Stephen Leaders and Stephen Ministers, trusting that in God's timing these important programs will be revived. And the list of church administration realities goes on.

I admit I've had times of impatience and frustration, which has now been tempered once again by remembering the plight of the Israelites. 700 years of waiting. 700 years of a faithful remnant. We cannot be impatient in just a year or two, but must pray for a strong spirit of perseverance, trusting in the Lord's direction and sustenance.

May we each continue to pray, praising God for the Messiah and the promise of his return, living with hope, living in trust, living with a spirit of anticipation and expectation.

Committees

Results of Special Congregational Meeting held on November 14th

With an initial quorum of 100 church members, consisting of people in person and connected in via Zoom, the following motion was made by Brad Roth on behalf of the Consistory:

- 1. To approve the work of the Facility Committee and their proposed solution for improvements to the restrooms, sanctuary and accessibility as presented in the 2021 informational packet;
- 2. To approve a project budget not to exceed \$1,620,000; and
- 3. That the Consistory form a Building Committee to formulate a comprehensive building plan and provide a firm quote of construction that will be brought before the congregation for further action.

After Gloria Lauber seconded the motion, Jeff Rutledge, Chairperson of the Facility Committee, introduced Rick Graber from G5 Architecture, the architect the Facility Committee worked with on the proposed concepts and budget. Jeff then shared an informational presentation on the proposal.

Following discussion of the motion, a paper ballot vote was conducted with the following results: 108 votes in approval of the motion and 4 votes not in approval of the motion. With that approval, the Consistory will be acting upon the following action steps:

- a. The Consistory will form a Building Committee, which people of the congregation may volunteer to be considered
- b. The Capital Campaign Committee will begin meeting once again
- c. Architectural firms will be interviewed and screened until one is chosen
- d. The Building Committee will work with and oversee the work of the architect
- e. The Building Committee will oversee all phases of the pre-construction and construction process

Search Committee for the Pastor of Music and Worship

The committee has learned from a few knowledgeable sources that there is a general reluctance on pastors to either make a change in their place of ministry or to move away from their current local area of ministry. It appears that such reluctance is due to either the known or unknown instability of ministry in churches across the nation as a result of the lingering effects of the pandemic.

As a result, the search committee has not received any further resumes or interest through the search avenues that were made use of in the last two pastoral search processes.

The search committee will be meeting on December 13th to explore the concept of contracting with a church-related staffing firm, which has been suggested by people who have been in contact with other churches regarding search processes.

The committee consists of Eric Nafziger, David Stuckey, Chris Baden, Sue Buehrer, Lynne Christman, Norm Fether, Kim Kern, Emma Nafziger, Avery Roth, Cayla Walker, Jocelyn Walker, and Pastor Erich.

Church Committees – Committee Members Needed

As 2021 draws to a close, each of our church committees are in the process of seeking new members for the next round of committee terms. The four primary committees of the church include:

Evangelism Committee – coordinates evangelism and discipleship ministries of the church – consists of 8 people, 2 from Consistory and 6 from the congregation, with 2 new people coming on each year, serving 3 year terms. Todd Nafziger is the current chairperson.

Fellowship Committee – coordinates and directs numerous fellowship activities of the church – consists of 8 people, 2 from Consistory and 6 from the congregation, with 2 new people coming on each year, serving 3 year terms. Crissi Stuckey is the current chairperson.

Mission Committee – coordinates mission activities of the church – consists of 11 people, 2 from Consistory and 9 from the congregation, with 3 new people coming on each year, serving 3 year terms. Ryan Christmas is the current chairperson.

Property Committee – oversees maintenance of church building and property – consists of 8 people, 2 from Consistory and 6 from the congregation, with 2 new people coming on each year, serving 3 year terms. Tim Beck is the current chairperson.

People interested in serving on one of these committees that are so vital to the on-going mission and ministry, may speak with the chairperson.

Consistory

Highlights of the November 15, 2021 Consistory Meeting

- 1. Budget & Stewardship Keith Kern financial reports were reviewed and approved; a report and recommendation on the Second Mile Fund will be made at the January annual meeting; a small group of Consistory members will meet with Mary Zimmerman to audit the 2021 financial records.
- 2. Fellowship Committee Crissi Stuckey the Veterans' breakfast was served on Nov. 14 during the Sunday school hour, serving 13 veterans/spouses and 4 members of the Fellowship Committee. Roger Merillat gave a presentation after the breakfast. Committee is making plans for the Senior citizen dinner and the children's Birthday Party for Jesus.
- 3. Mission Committee Ryan Christman the Alternative gift market is underway and will run until November 28th. This year the money raised will be used to bless the youth at Crossroad Child and Family Services. The mission budget is only \$1500 short of being met for the year, which means giving will more than likely exceed the budget, a great blessing! The Mission Committee is asking consistory to empower them to disperse the funds that go above the designated budget. Motion was approved.

- 4. Personnel Committee Jan Lindsay most staff reviews are completed, still waiting on insurance information hope to have it by the December meeting
- 5. Property Committee Tim Beck Due to the social media advertisement, 2 resumes have been received for the part-time maintenance position, and one interview has been held so far, and the committee is attempting to set up the other interview in the near future. The committee decided to wait until next spring to plant grass where the tree stumps were ground down. The ovens in the kitchen are inconsistent and unreliable due to the gas line supply issues, as the tank less water heater is taking up a lot of the gas. Committee is working with a local plumbing company and Ohio Gas to address the issue.
- 6. Search Committee Erich Christman the Committee was scheduled to interview a candidate that reached out to SJCC, but just minutes before the interview was to take place, the candidate emailed that they he had taken another position closer to their current home. The Search Committee discussed the idea of contracting with a church staffing company that would assist in the search and interview process. Two companies will be researched/interviewed. Area churches have used similar companies, with good success
- 7. Spiritual Council Erich Christman the nomination process is under way, with a list of candidates compiled for the positions of President, Secretary, Elders, and Deacon/Deaconesses.
- 8. Formation of a South Property Task Force Erich Christman tabled until the February 2022 meeting when new Consistory members will be on board.
- 9. DQ Land Purchase Erich Christman Brent Winzeler has paperwork started. Tom Henry will survey the piece of property, and then Brent will use that information for the sale transaction.
- 10. Congregational Meeting Follow-up Gary Frazier observed that it was a good idea to have an informational meeting after one of the services attendance was good. Zoom has been a great asset that allows people to participate in the meetings and the voting process. A Building Committee of 10-12 people needs to be formed.



Mission Corner

<u>December Mission-A-Month:</u> <u>Crossroad Child & Family Services</u>

For more than 134 years, Crossroad Child & Family Services in Fort Wayne, Indiana, has focused on the needs of children and families who have few alternatives. Today, they work with emotionally troubled children other providers have chosen not to work with, or have failed to help.
